## Administrator's Letter

This year Cambria-Friesland Schools made community service part of our Homecoming festivities. The vision of making our communities more a part of the homecoming activities allowed our students to experience firsthand the power of giving during a time when giving of self isn't the foremost consideration. Typically, homecoming week has high school students focused on skits, decorations, dances, and of course the traditional homecoming game. But this year, guided by the district's Culture and Climate Team, our students made a conscious decision to make the service of others part of their homecoming celebrations. It's not uncommon to hear an adult denounce or make a disparaging comment regarding today's youth. When something is vandalized or left broken, we quickly blame "those kids". When in fact we don't know who really was the culprit. But, it's easy for us when we have "those kids" to point the finger towards. Watching our high school students mentor the elementary children, or seeing Cambria-Friesland middle and high school students and teachers haul boxes of books from the basement of the Jane Morgan Memorial Library I was reminded of how incredible our students truly are. No job was too small, and no amount of rain could dampen their desire to not only carry out these services but do so with their best effort possible. Sometimes the deepest learning comes when we work not for our own gain, but instead for the benefit of others. I'm extremely proud of our staff for initiating and planning Community Pride Day 2019, and we should all take a moment to recognize both our staff and students who embraced the opportunity to serve our greater communities that day.

## Standards Based Grading

A number of years ago Wisconsin adopted the academic state standards. This began the process of curriculum course work would align with student performance for students and schools throughout the state of Wisconsin. Over the past three years the Cambria-Friesland Elementary School staff have explored and implemented curriculum and grading that reflects a mastery of these state standards. Grading for learning through a standards based model allows teachers to report what students know and how well students can apply what been learned. This allows for class instruction, assessment, and grading to be aligned with student learning and performance outcomes. Mastery of targeted learning goals has greater weight and relevance to student learning and achievement when compared to traditional grading models that focus on points and percentages. The staff and administration of Cambria-Friesland Schools see Standards Based learning targets and grades as an opportunity to continue to provide a level of rigor that challenges our students with a means to best measure each child's level of mastery in learning. This year, our Elementary grades Early Childhood through Fifth Grade will no longer provide letter grades with percentages as a means to track and record grades, but instead utilize the Standards Based grading approach. Juniors who took a practice ACT in September received results and are realizing they have some work ahead of them to meet their individual goals.

This year, we plan to implement time to specifically help not only the Juniors to build the needed skills; but also help Freshmen and Sophomores prepare for the ACT Aspire in hopes that they will be on track to do well on the ACT when they become Juniors.

To do this, we are creating "Yes We Can Wednesdays" starting October 30 through the dates for the ACT and ACT Aspire testing. One of the keys to preparing to do well is not trying to put things off until the last minute.


Regular practice with and exposure to sample and practice questions written in the same format as the exams is one of the best methods for improvement. Sometimes, even when students have the skills, they don't do well on tests that come in a format they are not familiar with. Spending one class period each week focused on these skills and building familiarity should prepare our students to truly do their best and we are looking forward to helping them achieve at the highest level they possibly can.

## Unexcused Absences

Phone calls and notes do not automatically result in an excused absence. Examples of reasons for absences that may not be excused include, but are not limited to, running errands, shopping, overslept, running late, or absences beyond the 10 allowed pre-arranged absences by parent without documentation.

The MS/HS has experienced an unusual number of students who believe that a parent phone call automatically means they are excused. However, students who are late or miss classes for unexcused reasons, even with parent permission, still have to deal with the consequences of the unexcused absence or tardy. In most cases, this will mean an after-school detention. If there is a pattern of such absences or tardiness, it can be considered habitual truancy which can involve truancy citations.

Elementary students have been celebrating the character trait enthusiastic. Students recognized as enthusiastic in their attitude towards friends, school, and others are shared over the announcements and get to participate in an end of the month drawing. Students in October were able to show their enthusiasm for helping others through Community Pride Day and their enthusiasm for school throughout homecoming week.

## November Character Trait of the Month Respectful

During November students will be taught on what respect looks like. Respect for others, respect for your environment, and respect for yourself. Students caught showing exemplary respectful behavior will be made known through the announcements and will be a part of the monthly drawing.

Anger Management
Elementary students in my classes and groups have spent the beginning of the year talking about the vast array of emotions and feelings we experience in a day or even a moment. Students were able to understand the purpose of feelings and emotions in that they give us information in to what is happening in our worlds. Understanding why we feel a certain way can give us valuable insight into a situation and help us navigate our lives. One emotion, however, has a tendency to shut down the rest of our "thinking brain". That emotion is anger. Students identified what causes anger and how to use it as an information tool rather than letting anger use them (e.g. tantrums, hitting, bad language, silent treatment, etc.). After understanding the progression of anger from trigger, to emotional response, to action and consequence, students were able to intervene in their anger response through anger management tools. Students worked together to perform role plays and offer examples of ways to cool off anger like controlled breathing, backwards counting, exercise, stress balls and distractions.

On Wednesday, September 25th, the juniors and seniors attended the annual English field trip to the American Players Theater at Spring Green, WI. This year's Shakespearean play was the tragedy Macbeth. The weather was absolutely gorgeous! The APT theater is an outdoor stage on the top of a picturesque hill. Shakespeare's Macbeth is a tragedy in which several people die. The main tragedy of course is how Macbeth and his wife, Lady Macbeth, become consumed by their desire for power and destroy their relationship in the process. After Macbeth quells a Scottish rebellion against the beloved Scottish King Duncan, he by chance meets three witches in the woods.
